- Children and young adults in **5 communities** were **treated to presentations by award-winning Oklahoma authors:** Claremore, Miami, Poteau, Tahlequah, and Wister

## At Work in **Oklahoma's** **District 5**

Everyday, Oklahomans in District 5 benefit from library and information services made possible through the **LSTA Grants to States Program**.

- Continuing education opportunities help staff from all sizes of public libraries—from the state's largest public library system, **Oklahoma County's Metropolitan Library System**, to smaller institutions like **Seminole Public Library** and **McLoud Public Library**—to improve local services.
- Health Literacy programs offered a variety of presentations and activities at the **Opportunities Industrialization Center (OIC)** in **Oklahoma City**, and **Seminole Public Library**.
- A digitization project helped seven institutions in District 5 preserve important historical materials for future generations. Participants included the **Edmond Historical Society and Museum**, the **Oklahoma City Zoo**, the **Oklahoma Historical Society**, the **Oklahoma Railway Museum**, and **Oklahoma City University**.
- Children and young adults in **Tecumseh** were treated to presentations by an award-winning **Oklahoma author** at their school and public library.
- LSTA funds provided new library materials to the **Mabel Bassett Correctional Center** in **McLoud**.
- LSTA funds also helped **Seminole Public Library** provide audio and eBook collections to members of that community.
